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

In 2018 the world was commemorating 100 years since the end of WW1 and throughout the year members of the St Ives and district attended a service at every village that had suffered losses by displaying the names on their memorials. It was part of a national scheme named Every Man Remembered and with our many new friends our promise was made to revisit each church although the pandemic halted our hopes until this year.

The renewed gathering for Hilton will take place on Sunday May 12 with a combined service at the Methodist Chapel at 11.15 when the eleven named men from Hilton on our Lych Gate Memorial will be remembered once more. With only 273 people registered in the earlier census of 1901 these eleven men would have been a huge proportional loss and all of them known so we hope to see many Hilton supporters at the Chapel on May 12.

For our historians, two further commemorations take place very shortly: 80 years since the Battle of Monte Cassino on May 18 and Anzac Day on April 26, the latter to be acknowledged at the Military Section of the Cambridge City Ceremony at 10.00 am. Other notable dates follow, particularly of course that of 80 years since D Day in June.

Archer has been with us for 10 months, and has really made progress. There is still a long way to go, but he is ready to take the next really big step in his journey to becoming a guide dog.

On Monday 8 April, Liz, who it to be his new trainer met him for the first time. We went for a walk together – this could have been embarrassing as he likes to go into, rather than walk past, the pub! He's made lots of friends there, and being a sociable sort of dog like to go in to say hello to everyone. And just have a quick check in case there happens to be any crumbs he can pick up. (There rarely are any, but it is always worth checking, isn't it?)

Thursday the 18th will be a day of very mixed feelings for us all. Archer leaves home and goes to big school! His humans will drive him to Leamington to Guide Dogs HQ and training school. We will all have a good look round his new training environment, have a cuppa and a chat with Liz, then Archer will stay while we will return to an empty house. We've known from day one this will happen, but it is still a very bittersweet day. Proud of "our boy" that he's progressed enough to

go to big school, but we will miss him enormously. The new friends we've made who are also puppy raisers all tell us there is no doubt, it is 100 per cent guaranteed that tears will be shed.

He will take his favourite toys with him, so he has something familiar to smell when he goes to his new home. He will have a new "mum" who will look after him evenings and weekends and who will drop him off at school and pick him up every

evening. We will be kept informed how he is doing. If he makes the grade, we will get a picture of him in his official new Guide Dogs jacket and harness. It will be his new owner's choice if we get to know where he eventually lives. If he doesn't make the grade as a guide dog, he may become a buddy dog to live with, and assist someone with different needs. If that doesn't work out either, there is a waiting list of people waiting to adopt dogs who don't make it.

So, has it been worth the work and the heartache? Absolutely yes, without a doubt. We've met some lovely people, and fabulous dogs, and had adoration from Archer, the friendliest, happiest dog you could wish for. He can be naughty, greedy, stubborn, hard work, exasperating, digs up plants and sheds so much hair my clothes turn white. But he is forgiving, clever, loving and adorable. The house will feel empty without him – maybe we will go to the pub and raise a glass to him.

But you know what? I'm never going to miss the early days' "accidents" and just think - no more poo bags! What about getting another one? There is much negotiating going on at home... watch this space!

Hilton Feast Week 2024 reaches back to The Middle Ages.


Sneak Preview:- Things to make for the 27 July Produce Show.

Contenders for the Alice, Thomas and Jacob Collen Cups can enter a jester's stick made from a wooden spoon, a knot garden in a seed tray, the initial of their first name, a potato gargoyle or one modelled in clay.... and more...

A Jester was employed by a wealthy household as their personal comedian. This picture shows the kind of stick commonly carried as a prop and mark of the trade. In Medieval illustrations, the jester's stick was a miniature version of the jester himself, wearing the same colours and the characteristic twolegged hat with bells.




Before the days of lawn mowers, gardens were designed around small beds for herbs and flowers and gravel paths. The patterns were intricate like knotted ropes hence their name. Knot Gardens.



Medieval scribes started chapters in the bible with an elaborately decorated initial letter. They used rich colours and gold leaf stand out to make works of art that are admired and treasured to this day.

The Green Man is a common image in folk-lore. The face surrounded by leaves can be found carved in stone on churches or college buildings, mounted on garden walls or set in paths. With his leafy





Craftsmen fashioned frightening beasts to peer down from the roof tops of churches and guild halls, like the one in the picture on the left.

Some other gargoyles, like those on the tower at Hilton Parish Church (pictured right) had a much simpler and more functional design.

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



Step into the Past

The Two Martins



In the 1960s, when I was in my teens, I had the privilege of hearing two people, who were both called Martin, speak and I thought you might be interested to know a little about them and how I came to hear them.

Although they came from different countries and their lives were very different in many ways, there were some common themes. Both Martins were prominent churchmen, both were well-known internationally, both had been jailed for their beliefs and both had experienced the evil side of humanity at first-hand. Both also have a place in history and both have left the world some famous quotations and insights.

Rev Martin Niemöller

The first Martin is Rev Martin Niemöller. I was only about 13 or 14 years old when my

parents took me to Grove Street Methodist Church in Retford to hear him speak. I can't remember what he spoke about although I am sure he would have covered some of his life experiences.

When he came to Retford, he was a President of the World Council of Churches and would have been about 70 years old. He was an ardent pacifist and a campaigner for nuclear disarmament. Knowing that, you might not guess much about his earlier life history, so I have listed a few key points here:-

- **1915:** Volunteered for the German U-boat fleet (Aged 23)
- 1918: Commander of U-boat U-67 and earned himself the nickname "The horror of Malta". Awarded the Iron Cross First Class.
- **1920:** Founder and Kommandant of a division of the Freikorps, which were nationalist groups of violently anticommunist former soldiers.
- 1934: Met Hitler to discuss Church politics and protested against the "Nazification" of the church. Became one of the founders of the Confessing Church.
- 1937: Arrested.
- 1938: Tried and acquitted. The court's decision was then over-ruled by Hitler and Niemöller was sent to the Sachsenhausen concentration camp.

In the final days of the war, he was transported to the Tyrol as one of 139 high profile prisoners, who had been selected as hostages for bargaining in any negotiations with the Allies. The hostages came from 17 countries, including Britain. However, the prisoners discovered that their captors, Hitler's SS, also had orders to murder them.

The story of what happened in the Tyrol

would make a good story for a film because it led to an armed confrontation between the SS and the German army in the village of Niederdorf. In the end, the SS surrendered and the army took charge of the prisoners, who were then liberated by the Americans a few days later.

Niemoeller's statement on his experience of Nazi Germany has become well-known:-

First they came for the communists, and I did not speak out – because I was not a communist

Then they came for the trade unionists, and I did not speak out - because I was not a trade unionist

Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out – because I was not a Jew

Then they came for me – and there was noone left to speak for me.

Rev Dr Martin Luther King

A few years later, in November 1967, I had the privilege of hearing Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King speak.

I remember this occasion rather better than the first, as I was a student at Newcastle University at the time and I was one of the students fortunate enough to get a ticket to the honorary degree ceremony at which he was to be awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Civil Law.

What I didn't know then was that he had been in jail in Alabama only about two weeks before the ceremony and that he was in the UK for only 24 hours, arriving in Newcastle in the early hours that day.

Martin Luther King was well-known as the leader of the civil rights movement and as an advocate of non-violent protest despite violence being used against him many times, including having his home bombed, being stabbed and being stoned. He was also jailed on a number of occasions.

In 1964, at the age of 35, he was awarded the

Nobel Peace Prize, making him the youngest recipient at the time. Interestingly, Martin Niemöller publicly supported Dr King's nomination for the prize.

Dr King was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee in April, 1968, less than five months after the degree ceremony in Newcastle.

I think his most famous speeches were the "I have a dream" speech in 1963 and one just before his death which included the line "I've been to the mountaintop". These are easy to find, so I will just add a short piece from his speech in Newcastle:-

"It may be true that the law cannot make a man love me but it can restrain him from lynching me: and I think that is pretty important also."



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





A Church Full of Art

I listen to a fair bit of radio – usually Radio 4. Two items caught my attention recently. The first, so poignant, I parked up and stayed in the car, transfixed. Simon Boaz, speaking about having only a few months to live due to cancer.

He spoke of having lived his best life. He spoke of how at 46, having lived longer than most people in history, as well as in many parts of the world today, could ever expect. He spoke of the trillion to one chance of having a life at all – think... what if your parents had never met!

And whilst not being religious, he spoke of the equally unlikely notion that there cannot be some kind of design behind the creation of the universe. In view of this, he talked of hope – the possibility of something beyond. He spoke of being surrounded by love and the best we could do whilst here being to show as much love to others as we can.

All this was better than any sermon I could deliver and inspired me to review my priorities in recognition of the gift of life, the limits to this gift and the fragility of our being. Quite transformative.

The other piece was very different; on the imminent risk to our economy with China set to dominate the electric car market having, over the last 20 years, developed city sized car plants, bespoke shipping facilities and owning the rights to 80% of the world's sources of cobalt – the essential component for car batteries. Game over for our automobile industry was the inevitable conclusion!

Aside from bewailing our country's inability to plan long term for anything, it was the fear

such developments bring about that struck me as they explained that any less-than-friendly country would be capable of bringing all our cities to a complete halt.

So, on one hand the freedom inherent in recognising life as a real gift. On the

a real gift. On the other, fear likely to cause entrenchment and rigidity.

It's to this inherent human capacity to mess things up that God speaks hope. This month churches celebrate Pentecost – the outpouring of the Holy Spirit transforming the lives of thousands immediately after the death and resurrection of Christ 2000 years ago.

Millions and millions have since testified to something like what Simon Boaz was talking about, but more. Faith in Christ as God, God with us now through the Holy Spirit and the everlasting hope of empowering us to live freely that this brings. Not something that can easily be explained but certainly something that can be experienced.

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Pitfalls for the Unrepresented Divorce Litigant!

Nowadays many divorcing couples view the use of a solicitor as an unnecessary luxury. Increasingly, those engaged in a divorce and other family related matters choose to act for themselves.

The almost complete abolition of Legal Aid some years ago has, to an extent, fostered this climate of self-determination. The truth of the matter however is that a divorce, coupled with resolving a financial dispute, is often far from straightforward.

Many spouses acting for themselves never seek advice because they don't know they are making mistakes. Common issues in financial cases include:

- Spouses dividing up their assets by agreement, piecemeal and prematurely, without first knowing the value of all the assets. Asset division on divorce should only properly be carried out when the entire marital pot has been valued and its overall worth assessed:
- One of the parties deciding to prematurely secure a Final Order (formerly called a Decree Absolute) dissolving the marriage, before consideration has been given to settling the finances. This should usually be postponed until all money matters are agreed and formally finalised;
- Procedural errors, for e.g. wrongly drafting court paperwork, causing court delays of many months.
- Unrepresented parties may delay proceedings through uncertainty about the

- procedure or may wrongly insist their legal view of the case is correct;
- A spouse believing they can later re-open a financial settlement approved by the court, so as to claim more money from their exspouse. The general rule is that there is only one "bite of the cherry", with any settlement being full and final.

All of the above pitfalls and more can be avoided if a solicitor is engaged to explore opportunities for settlement, which, much of the time, can be achieved without court involvement

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Life on a Plate

Chicken Za'atar 'One Tray Bake'

This easy one sheet-pan meal uses a Mediterranean herb mix called za'atar. You will be able to find this is in the Grape Tree in St Ives or simply use dried herbs. You can use chicken portions or buy a St George Chicken from Rosegate Farm in Swavesey and portion it yourself!

Ingredients

4 teaspoons za'atar or 2 teaspoons of dried thyme thyme and 2 teaspoons of dried oregano

2 tbsp olive oil, plus more for drizzling Salt and freshly ground pepper Bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs and drumsticks four of each

1 x bag of new potatoes – charlotte are best for this, cut in half lengthwise

1 medium red onion, peeled, halved lengthwise, and cut into ½-inch wedges

1 lemon, cut in half

1 bunch kale, stalks removed, torn in two inch pieces (about 4 packed cups)



Method

- Preheat your oven to 425 degrees (200c in a fan oven, gas mark 7), with racks in upper and lower thirds. In a small bowl, mix za'atar (or dried herbs) with two tablespoons oil and two teaspoons salt.
- With a sharp knife, cut two one inch long slashes in each piece of chicken, through skin and down to bone. Rub za'atar (or dried herbs) mixture all over chicken and into the slashes.
- 3. On a rimmed baking sheet, toss potatoes with one tablespoon oil; season with salt and pepper. Roast in lower third of oven, stirring once, until starting to brown, about 20 minutes. Toss the onion with

- the remaining one tablespoon oil; season with salt and pepper; add to the baking sheet along with the chicken pieces and lemon halves. Roast for 40 minutes.
- 4. Switch now to grill mode. Move baking sheet and grill until the chicken is browned, 2 to 3 minutes. Drizzle kale lightly with oil; season with salt and pepper. Scatter the kale over the chicken and grill until just wilted. Let cool slightly, then squeeze the lemon halves over chicken. Remove the chicken to a platter; toss the vegetables together and serve alongside. Lovely served with chargrilled red peppers.

Latest news from Fenstanton Parish Council

Projects developed in 2023/2024

It has been a busy year for your Parish Council, with a number of improvements and projects completed. At the beginning of the financial year, the Council purchased a new Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS). This sign can be moved around the village and serves as a helpful reminder to drivers to adhere to the speed limit. It can also record speed data. Your Council successfully introduced a 20-mph speed limit to a significant portion of the village.

A Commemorative Bench in memory of Colin White is now located on the Green on Honey Hill. The Pond has undergone further improvements, including the upgrading of the pathway and the installation of a Duck House. The surfacing at the Metal Park has also been improved. The hedges at Chequer Street car park and Play Park have been removed and replaced with a new metal fence, allowing for a better sight line, with more improvements to come.

The completion of the parking bays on Chequer Street has improved the outlook and condition of the verge. The Cemetery Hedge has been removed to potentially allow for further burial plots. Improved drainage has been added to the Church car park via a soak-away. Your Parish Council has also completed its promised £50,000 contribution to the Village Hall Trust from the community infrastructure levy and has committed a further £45,000 from precept. In the coming weeks, your Parish Council will be installing Heritage Trail information boards at various locations around the village. These boards will provide a history of the village, so keep your eyes and ears peeled for more information on this. Additionally, a new defibrillator will be installed at Rookery Place in memory of Geoff Pryke.

Much of the work carried out over the past year has been funded by the community infrastructure levy, which your Parish Council was required to spend by the end of March 2024.







Village sign

The old village sign has now been restored by Keith Collier, who is a resident of Swan Road and the owner of Keith Collier Engineering. The restoration work took several months and was done with great care. The sign now takes pride of place in its new location on the grassy area where Bell Lane meets Swan Road. Our thanks go to Keith for his time and work.







Vehicles parking on verges and other areas

Your Parish Council would like to remind drivers to avoid parking on verges, pavements, near junctions, or any other areas that may cause danger to others. The Council has been receiving frequent complaints from residents regarding irresponsible parking, so please take extra care when parking and find a safe spot. You can park your vehicle at the Church car park or Chequer Street car park.

Potholes - repairs

On Thursday 7 March, your Parish Council Chairman held a meeting with a representative from Cambridgeshire County Council to raise the issue of potholes in the village. Following this meeting, CCC has already started repairing the potholes and has committed to completing the work in the coming weeks. The Parish Council will continue to work closely with the CCC team.

Drainage and flooding

On Monday 18 March, the Chairman and Vice-Chairman had a meeting with representatives from Cambridgeshire County Council to draw attention to the blocked drains and gullies located around the village. Following the meeting, CCC is now preparing a schedule of work to address the issues raised.

Next Parish Council meetings

The Parish Council's Annual Meeting will be held on **Thursday 9 May at 7pm** in the Church Centre. The subsequent meeting is scheduled for **Thursday 13 June**.



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Business Spotlight

Our very own environmentalist

Anne Woodroff, mother of four, recognised when her son James was a small boy, his love of the outdoors and all things to do with nature. Born in Willingham, James moved with his family to Fenstanton in 1972 and has remained there ever since. The Woodroffs are a local family with all the siblings living in the area; Jon and Emma in Fenstanton and Tomas in Fen Drayton. James' father Keith, now deceased, was one of the founder members of the village magazine that became Spectrum and is now the The Journal. Anne still resides in Fenstanton today.

"I've always been interested in nature and as a child collected bugs and worms. I loved frog spawn and in 1980 this became an obsession when a tank full of tadpoles hatched and we had froas hopping all over the kitchen!" James explains, Anne. his mother, contacted Blue Peter who were at the time doing project on wildlife ponds. James quickly found himself and his frogs on the TV programme collecting a Blue Peter badge.

On leaving school James naturally went into horticulture working in Fen Drayton growing lettuces and tomatoes. In his downtime he used to be a keen pike fisherman with his biggest catch being 33lbs. Ouite a fish!

He always wanted to work with conservation and in 2018 set up Hamptons Groundcare and Pest Control. "I wanted to have a business that was more cost effective than the national chains and more professional than the one-man-bands. Everyone employed by Hamptons is fully qualified, which involves an intense residential course to reach the desired standard. Six years on we now employ five people providing a personal local service." James continues. "We have had some interesting call-outs since starting. Snake

hunting one day and then dealing with the removal of a hornets nest the next! It's quite something when you have 2000 angry hornets heading directly to you!"



Continuing James' environmental ethos, all the profits from Hamptons are ploughed back into local conservation. "Over the

years we have sown acres of wildflowers, planted over 300 trees, laid metres of hedges and installed numerous nesting boxes. For me the environment is paramount and the more we can do to protect it the better."

When James is not trapping moles or dealing with flee infestations he is happy to spend hours metal detecting. Inspired by Toby Jones in the TV programme The Detectorists, with permission but in secret locations, James scans the ground to unearth hidden treasures. "Already I have found numerous

historical artefacts. Recently I uncovered a

George III cartwheel penny from 1797 and a medieval crotal bell, which was used on horses to warn pedestrians. It is fascinating what you can discover just around Fenstanton."

Nature Walk Yase

It's no secret that children love to be outdoors, and with the weather finally starting to warm up, why not go out and have fun? Nature walks are always a favourite with my daughter, she has always loved finding and inspecting different leaves and flowers. We used to go out with a little bucket for her to fill with all her little treasures, but now my daughter always asks for "the pokey flower pot" (kid's always make up much better names for everything, right?). We hope you enjoy this easy to make, nature walk accessory.

Step 1

Message from the chair

As I write this, the sun is shining at last and the blossom on the cherry trees is spectacular! It raises the spirits after a wet and cold winter.

This past month the parish council has focused on the recent floods, meeting with relevant authorities and residents.

Crime in Fen Drayton

We have experienced another spate of crime in the village, particularly house and outbuilding burglary. It has left residents feeling angry and vulnerable.

Since the autumn, when the parish council raised crime issues with Anthony Browne MP, the Crime Commissioner, the police and the community safety team, the parish council has continued to request support. We have asked the police and community safety team to come to meet residents and listen to all the concerns raised. In the meantime, it is essential that residents report every crime or concern, no matter how small, so a picture is built up of any overall pattern.

Dog mess

At the March parish council meeting some residents expressed their concern about the amount of dog mess on the village pavements and grass areas.

The majority of dog owners are compliant and pick up their dog's mess, but there are a few that don't or won't. There are plenty of dog bins in the village and if they are full, the rubbish bins can be used. It is unpleasant for everyone but especially for our children walking to school and playing on the grassed areas, so PLEASE pick up after your dog/s!

Flooding

Every town and village close to the Great Ouse has suffered from flooding this winter. Parish councils continue to seek information and action from the authorities that are responsible for the water courses.

In March, Hemingford Grey PC wrote to the Environment Agency to point out that four out of seven control gates at St Ives staunch have been unable to open for many months, increasing the peak river flood level by 20+ cms. The council asked why the gates have not been maintained.

In Fen Drayton, Anthony Browne MP, at the parish council's request, chaired a meeting of the villages in the Oxholme and Covell's Drain catchment areas (Elsworth, Conington, Swavesey) and CCC, SCDC, Anglian Water and National Highways. The Environment Agency refused to attend.

Everyone contributed to a constructive discussion about what may be done to mitigate and prevent future flooding. Short-term actions such as one-way valves and self-inflating walls along the High Street could be implemented before next winter. In the medium term, options for more sluices and pumps were discussed.

CCC and SCDC agreed to commission a consultant"s report on the feasibility of various longer-term solutions and National Highways will review whether the A14 balancing ponds are working properly.

CCC's Floodmobile will be in the village hall car park on Saturday 11 May between 10 am and 4 pm. Expert advice will be on hand offering practical measures to make your property more flood resilient. Anglian Water also hopes to be there.

District Councillor's message

The issue of flooding in Fen Drayton is still an ongoing concern. I worked with the parish council and Anthony Browne MP to pull together a meeting of all parties who

could be involved in finding a way forward, as reported in the previous item.

The community warden service managed by Cambridge and Peterborough Age UK is experiencing financial problems, but SCDC has agreed to find the shortfall until April 2025. Hopefully, other funding authorities will also recognise the value of the warden service and fund it properly. However, I feel that the scheme needs a makeover. The word "warden" has connotations, which stop many people using the service. Any ideas for a more suitable name would be greatly appreciated!



The speaker for the evening was Becky Proctor, the Heritage Officer for the Royal Papworth Hospital who told the open meeting principally of its inspiration and history.

The ethos of the hospital was the care of male patients suffering from TB when 41,000 people died in 1915 (in 2012, 600) and the instigator was Pendrill Varrier Jones.

The objective was intensive nursing, plenty of quality food, bed rest and a slow, gradual return to the ability to work and with women being treated later from 1923.



on the battlefields, malnourishment, risks to new mothers and lack of pasteurised milk for babies and small children.

The first patients and four staff arrived on February 12th 1918 firstly from Bourn, then to Papworth Hall where the very ill were upstairs and recovering people 'demoted' downstairs. Then they were given simply built, rather primitive sheds in which they lived whatever the weather and aiming for an equal gradual return to paid work. Imagine bed sores, surgical spirit and bed pans!

The hospital developed over many years especially following the new NHS in 1948, then came the Cardiac unit and first open heart surgery in 1958. To fulfil the need to reduce the temperature the patient was installed in a bath of ice and would receive ice burns! Keith Castle received the first new heart in 1979 and Brenda Barbara the first heart/lung in Europe 40 years ago and the reputation was now world wide.

As Becky said - 'a remarkable hospital' and in her thanks on our behalf, Pauline said 'long may the work continue'. New Papworth moved to the Addenbrooke's site five years ago and was granted Royal status by Her Majesty the Oueen for its centenary in 2018.



Open Gardens in Fenstanton

Four gardens are opening as part of the National Garden Scheme in Fenstanton this month, Saturday 18 and Sunday 19 May.

The four contrasting gardens, two large and two small set around some of the oldest houses in the village.

Ivy Cottage on Bell Lane is a beautiful example of of a mature cottage garden with a wide variety of unusual plants. Whilst Wimpole House on Talls Lane has a delightful selection of roses, mature tress and shrubs along with pond brimming with life.

The Manor House on Chequer Street, once the home of Lancelot 'Capability' Brown has a more formal garden wrapped around the house with winding paths between well stocked boarders. The garden features two apples trees reputedly planted by Brown, that originally formed part of a larger orchard.

5 Church Lane by contrast is a hidden gem of a garden packed with ferns, hostas and traditional cottage plants.

Fenstanton is famous for, amongst other things, its link with Capability Brown. So why not when in the village visit his memorial in the Parish Church or the grave stone of one of the country's most famous landscape gardeners. Whilst in the church view the "Church full of art" exhibition featuring the work of local artists.

Delicious home made teas can be enjoyed at the Untied Reform Church opposite The Manor House in the centre of the village, two minutes stroll from the four open gardens on show. Parking is available in the car park on Chequer Street or at the Parish Church. Please do not park on the grass verges or any of the village greens.

The gardens are open between 1-5pm both days and the combined entry ticket is £6.00 per person (children under 15 years free), available at the gate of each garden. Dogs are welcome in the all the gardens (poo bags provided!). Unfortunately, only Wimpole House has good disabled access.









Afoot in the Garden

May is our oldest month

The first six months names are associated with Roman gods except May, which is named after Maia the Greek goddess of growth and fertility. Followed by two months named after Roman emperors and four VACANT, waiting months with Roman numbers. Traditionally Wisteria are one of Mays floral glories. I once spent four years coxing a 10-year-old wisteria into flower only to be asked if I could I remove half the flowers! As it was too gaudy for a Cambridge university Professor.

Many plants have juvenile and adult growth (Ivy is a classic example) and wisteria flowers on 'adult' spurs. To promote spurs regular pruning is required. Train main branches horizontally and tip when they reach the correct size, this will generate a flush of side shoots. Prune these side shoots back to 3/4 buds to encourage spurs and repeat annually and after flowering. Japanese wisterias (floribunda) have shorted broader racemes, and twine in a clockwise direction and more readily have a second flush of flowers. Chinese wisterias twine in an anticlockwise direction and have narrower longer flowers.

'How do I control greenfly (aphids)?' is another question that regularly pops up in May. Aphids are an important food source for smaller nestlings, especially Sparrows and Tits. Instead of using insecticides I recommend leaving them and excepting a few distorted flowers. Alternatively, washing them off with a soapy water or a hose with the nozzle on a jet setting.

Top Tups

- Prune spring flowering shrubs.
- Tie in climbers.
- Feed and mulch.
- Plant summer pots.
- Replace hose washers.



Tasks for May

Prune back early flowering shrubs like forsythia, ribes and Japanese quince.

Remove seed heads from hellebores, stake perennials and tie in climbers as required. Apply liquid feed around spring bulbs and top dress your borders and roses with granular fertilizer.

Prepare and plant up your summer pots with summer bedding. Always use fresh compost ideally one designed specifically for summer pots incorporating a wetting agent and water retentive granules. Check hose pipes and fittings for leaks and if necessary, replace the washers, it is far cheaper than buying new connectors.

News from Fenstanton Glebe Allotment Association



Now that the days are longer and warmer it is a busy, thriving time at the Allotments. Potatoes, broad beans, carrots, garlic, leeks, cabbages and more are being planted and rhubarb harvested. Apple, pear and cherry trees are bursting into blossom. All our plots are now taken, and we have many new plotholders making excellent progress on their land, including a lot of young families with children enjoying digging, planting and collecting barrowfuls of manure.

There is a growing community spirit amongst plotholders with seed, plant and advice swapping, and an enjoyable pre-Christmas get together with hot chocolate, mulled wine and cakes. A summer barbecue is planned for later this year - we even have a new social secretary.

Plotholders are all very aware of the responsibility they have to protect and nurture the land we are lucky enough to tend. Many plotholders are now growing flowers and plants to attract insects – especially bees – and trying to avoid the use of plastics. We collect rainwater for our plots and some of the plotholders at the top end of the site have cleared rubbish out of the woodland next to

the A1307 and planted bulbs and wild flowers to enhance the environment.

We have developed a very positive partnership with the Parish Council and work closely with Jo and Ali, the Parish Clerks, to ensure that the operation of the Allotments is smooth and as simple as we can make it. Having now allocated all 15 of the brand-new plots on the right-hand side of the site, our waiting list is now somewhat depleted so we would welcome any interest shown by members of the community who would like to commit themselves to an allotment plot. The contact number is below, and anyone interested would be welcome to make an appointment to come down and have a look round. We are aware that there will be just a few plots becoming available from September.

All the evidence points to the great benefits of having an allotment. Fresh fruit and vegetables, good physical activity and a wonderful escape from the trials and tribulations of life. Come and join us!

Green Open Spaces Report

The Council received a report regarding the ongoing work to manage the green open spaces in Hilton, including:

- A large elm on Sparrow Way had gradually bent over and was supported by what was one
 of its lower branches. This was reported to both the Clerk and Tree Officer by one of the
 Maintenance Contractors. The Clerk reported this to CCC (who own these trees), and they
 took it down immediately.
- There were few volunteers for the ivy cutting event, however these volunteers achieved a
 lot
- The covered ford was mainly blocked with leylandii cuttings from properties further up the watercourse and was cleared by JSC Services
- The maze remains closed as it has been waterlogged for many months and needs to dry out further
- The Tree Officer has tidied up the tattered ends of the trees and bushes left after the flailing carried out last autumn. These now make up a number of piles between the Wilderness brow and the Fenstanton Road.
- The Maintenance Person and the Tree Officer have gathered together many small branches
 that have been blown down over the winter months into several heaps round the village.
 When The Green and The Wilderness dry out sufficiently to allow a car to be driven over
 them all the various heaps of branches will be taken to the bonfire site and burnt.
- One of the PCs tree contractors will be working on the trees at the Village Hall and down Graveley Way on 23 April.
- A tree has fallen over the Town Drain near the Wilderness bridge but is not urgent
- A tree has fallen in Reeve's Ditch but is not currently urgent
- Cllr R. Norton and the Tree Officer met with one of the Maintenance Contractors to resolve the contract.

D-Day Beacon Lighting Event Thursday 6 June

Hilton Parish Council received an update regarding the plan to hold a beacon lighting event on Thursday 6th June. Hilton Feast Week will be invited to run the pavilion bar, which will be open from 8pm, with the beacon lit at 9:15pm.

The Council's standing orders and financial regulations will be updated to reflect the changes in procurement, which raises the

threshold for the tender process from £25k to £30k.

Drainage Holes in the Retaining Wall of the Ware

Hilton Parish Council has received a quote for £980+VAT to install four additional drainage holes in the retaining wall of the Ware. The Council resolved to defer this matter to the May meeting, after the Finance Committee had reviewed the finances.

PC17 Streetlight near the Lych Gate bridge

The bowl on this streetlight does not fit but cannot be replaced as it is now obsolete. The Council discussed the proposal to replace the lantern with an LED unit but resolved to also defer this matter to the May meeting, after the Finance Committee had reviewed the finances.

Telegraph Pole on the Green

Hilton Parish Council discussed the erection of a telegraph pole on the Green by County Broadband, which was not discussed with the Council prior to its installation. The Council resolved to contact County Broadband and request that they consider alternative options to the telegraph pole.

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
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

Bird's Eye View

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

One hundred years ago, the land that would become Fen Drayton Lakes was a series of floodplain meadows in the river valley of the Great Ouse. This began to change when low-scale sand and gravel extraction started to take place during the war years in the 1940s for local military and agricultural use. Commercial extraction began in the 1950s and for the next 40-odd years the site became a large, active quarry exporting material for construction around the region.

Nowadays, Fen Drayton Lakes is an RSPB nature reserve made up of a variety of habitats comprising open water, reedbed and wetland mixed with grassland, scrub, and woodland. A huge variety of wildlife is drawn to the area with over 1900 different species recorded on site to date, including 230 species of bird. 26 species of butterfly and almost 500 species of flowering plant.

As we head into the summer months, wildlife is all around, making it a fantastic time to visit. You're never far from water and wildlife here; it surrounds you wherever you wander. Explore the woods and catch glimpses of secluded bays and pools. You won't be able to miss majestic Mute Swans on the lakes, but you'll need to look a little harder to see the many colourful insects. The riverside meadows are alive with nature reeds rustling, birds warbling, grasshoppers chirping and bees buzzing.
